



Local Weed Control Plan Rhus Tree

Castlereagh Macquarie County Council Local Noxious Weed Control Plan for Rhus Tree (*Toxicodendron succedaneum*).

LEGISLATIVE & REGULATORY SITUATION

Current Declaration:

Rhus Tree is a Class 4 noxious weed in the Castlereagh Macquarie County Council Local Control Area. Class 4 noxious weeds are plants that pose a threat to primary production, the environment or human health, are widely distributed in an area to which the order applies and are likely to spread in the area or to another area.

Obligations (Section 12 from the Noxious Weeds Act 1993) - Private occupiers of land must control noxious weeds on land:

An occupier (other than a public authority or a local control authority) of land to which a weed control order applies must control noxious weeds on the land as required under the order.

Maximum penalty: *40 penalty units*

Note: If an occupier fails to comply with obligations under a weed control order, those obligations may be enforced against the owner of the land as well as the occupier by a weed control notice issued under section 18.

CONTROL MEASURES

Prescribed Control Measures as per Order 19 Noxious Weeds Act 1993:

The growth and spread of the weed must be controlled to the extent specified by the Local Control Authority in the following control measures

Control of Rhus Tree:

1. Prevent the spread and growth of the weed by treating all plants. The following control methods may be used.

- Cut-stump application of a registered herbicide, as per label directions.
- Mechanical removal.

2. All parts of the plant must be prevented from growing within 5 metres of a property boundary or watercourse.

Note: Rhus Tree can cause extreme allergic reactions through physical contact with any part of the tree – especially the sap. Any trimming or removal should be carried out in winter after leaves have fallen and sap has retreated from the stem. Always use personal protective equipment to cover as much skin as possible when handling any part of the tree. Do not burn the wood from the tree.

This control plan is published in accordance with Order 19 of the Noxious Weeds Act 1993 for the Class 4 declared plants. The plan outlines the legal requirements for the control of Rhus Tree by private occupiers of land in the Castlereagh Macquarie County Council local control area.
